SURVEY DESCRIPTION

Completed with the license renewal in late summer 2017

Followed-up as needed by licensing board

The final response rate was 100%

SURVEY DESCRIPTION (continued)

Questions asked of dentists included:

- Gender and age
- Specialty
- Location and hours of practice
- Whether they were accepting new patients
- Whether they work with hygienists
- Years worked in Vermont
- Efforts to hire an associate

KEY FINDINGS

- There are 381 dentists working in Vermont
- 82% are primary care dentists, including:
 - 299 general dentists
 - 14 pediatric dentists

Excluded from this report:

- 85 dentists who renewed, but do not practice in Vermont
 - 17 of the dentists not currently practicing in Vermont said they will start practicing in Vermont within 12 months

KEY FINDINGS

- 211 have a Doctor of Dental Surgery (DDS) degree
- 170 have a Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD) degree
- 328 reported as White, 16 as Asian, 7 as Black or African-American, and 4 as Hispanic

KEY FINDINGS

- 21% work 40 or more hours per week, while 55% work between 30 and 40 hours per week. (This only counts direct patient care.)
- 15% practice in more than one location
- For main location site (site with most annual hours)
 - 67% practiced at single site privately owned clinics
 - 20% practiced at multi-site privately owned clinics
 - 8% practiced at FQHCs and 1% at hospital owned clinics
- 3.5% worked at a practice that was a part of a Dental Support Organization (DSO)

KEY FINDINGS (continued)

- 3.7% of the dentists plan to decrease hours in the next year
- 2.9% of the dentists plan to retire or leave Vermont practice in the next year
- 35% of the dentists are 60 or older
- 107 of the 299 general dentists are 60 or older
- 5 of the 21 oral surgeons are 60 or older
- 4 of the 13 endodontists are 60 or older
- In Rutland County, 58% of the primary care dentists are 60 or older

KEY FINDINGS (continued)

In 2017, as compared with 2015:

- There are 2.6 more FTEs in primary care, and 3.1 fewer FTEs in specialty care
- Fewer dentists are working less than 30 hours per week

KEY FINDINGS (continued)

In 2017, as compared with 2015:

- Average wait time to primary care appointment has decreased from 2.6 to 2.0 weeks
- Percentage accepting new Medicaid patients has declined:
 - –60% accept new Medicaid patients
 - -33% accept 5+ new Medicaid patients / month


KEY FINDINGS (continued)

In 2017, as compared with 2015:

- There are 2 fewer dentists in total
- There are 22 more dentists under age 45
- There are 36 fewer dentists aged 45-64
- There are 10 more dentists aged 65+






82% of dentists provide primary care (general or pediatric)

PRACTICE SETTING




61% of dentists work in a group practice or clinic





AGE DISTRIBUTION




48% of all dentists are age 55 or older

AGE DISTRIBUTION BY GENDER




44% of the males, but only 11% of the females, are age 60 or older

NUMBER OF DENTISTS BY COUNTY




31% of primary care dentists, and 49% of specialists, work in Chittenden County

FULL TIME EQUIVALENT DENTISTS BY COUNTY




31% of primary care FTEs, and 46% of specialist FTEs, are in Chittenden County

PRIMARY CARE DENTIST TO POPULATION RATIOS BY COUNTY AND DENTIST AGE




Grand Isle and Rutland have the largest percentage of dentists age 60+

PATIENT CARE HOURS PER WEEK




On average, a dentist provides 31 hours per week of patient care

AVERAGE WAIT TIME FOR NEW PATIENTS




Average wait time for new patients of general dentists has decreased since 2015

AVERAGE WAIT TIME FOR CURRENT PATIENTS




Average wait times for current patients have generally decreased since 2015



WORK WITH HYGIENISTS & DENTAL ASSISTANTS




Interest in therapists was highest at larger group practices & clinics

ACCEPTING NEW PATIENTS




97% accept new non-Medicaid patients, 60% accept new Medicaid patients

ACCEPTING 5+ NEW PATIENTS / MONTH







YEARS WORKED IN VERMONT




28% of the dentists have worked in Vermont for 30 or more years.





PRIMARY CARE FTEs, BY COUNTY, 2007 & 2017




Rutland, Windham and Windsor Counties have lost FTEs since 2007

AGE DISTRIBUTION, 2007 & 2017




There have been increases in the percent of dentists under 40 and 65+
