# Vermont PRAMS Data Brief

#### Prenatal Counseling – part 6 Breastfeeding

This is a report on the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS), a survey conducted on a sample of Vermont women with live births since 2001. This report includes data from 2001<sup>a</sup>-2008.

Included in the survey are questions about the content of prenatal care. Previous reports have examined trends in prenatal counseling, differences in responses across demographics for the prenatal counseling questions, and compared maternal behaviors and birth outcomes with prenatal counseling in specific topic areas. This report focuses on prenatal breastfeeding counseling and breastfeeding outcomes. The wording for the questions examined here is included at the end of this report.

### **Prenatal Counseling and Breastfeeding:**

- Nearly 90% of mothers indicated that a prenatal heath care worker had talked with them about breastfeeding their baby.
- First time mothers, younger mothers, and mothers on WIC were most likely to have had a prenatal breastfeeding discussion.
- Mothers reporting a prenatal breastfeeding discussion were significantly more likely to initiate breastfeeding than women who did not report a prenatal breastfeeding discussion.
- Despite the higher rate of breastfeeding initiation, mothers reporting prenatal breastfeeding counseling were no more likely to continue breastfeeding beyond 4 or 8 weeks than women who did not have prenatal breastfeeding counseling.
- Mothers reporting that they had prenatal breastfeeding counseling also reported a more supportive breastfeeding environment in the hospital.
