

CSHN Program Spotlight: Health Systems Team



Our small, but mighty team is relatively new to CSHN, so we wanted to take the opportunity to (re)introduce ourselves. The Health Systems Team was formed in 2023 and works to improve access and equity for the Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (CYSHCN) population. We collaborate with community and intergovernmental partners to address systemic gaps, generating resources and advance the system that supports families.

Examples of what we've been up to:

- Updating and creating resources for families and community partners
- Developed internal systems of data maintenance and tracking
- Current projects include assisting partners for CYSHCN in state custody and developing a statewide resource guide.
- Supporting related work around Pediatric Feeding Disorder and families moving to Vermont with CYSHCN.

Community Partner Spotlight: Vermont WIC Program

Vermont WIC is a public health nutrition program whose mission is to assure healthy pregnancies and birth outcomes and healthy growth and development for infants and children up to age 5. WIC does this by providing nutritious foods, information and education on healthy eating, breastfeeding/chestfeeding promotion and support, and referrals to health care and community social service resources.

Individuals who live in Vermont who are pregnant or recently pregnant, and caregivers of children under 5, including parents, grandparents, and foster parents, can apply to WIC. Applicants must meet federal income guidelines or be active on Medicaid, 3SquaresVT, or Reach Up.

WIC clinics are offered statewide through 12 Vermont Department of Health Local Health Offices and at outlying sites. Families who participate in WIC attend appointments about every 6 months. A nutrition professional conducts a nutrition and health assessment, issues a monthly food package based on nutrients critical for times of rapid growth and development, provides family-centered nutrition counseling, and makes referrals to other health and social services. Foods on the WIC food package include fruits and vegetables, whole grains, eggs, yogurt, milk, cereal, peanut butter and beans, and infant foods.

CSHN Family Partner Program

Did you know CSHN has a Family Partnership project?

Vermont's Children with Special Health Needs (CSHN) program partners with parents and caregivers to inform short-term projects and programmatic needs. An implementation team representing multiple CSHN programs formed a team that conducted a statewide recruitment process and in Fall 2024 CSHN was able to launch this work with families.

The implementation team identified equity, belonging, authenticity, and trust as the core values to guide this collaborative work.

We know that creating a Family Partnership Program is meaningful for families who utilize CSHN programs and services as an essential part of increasing health equity and improving services for all. As such, the CSHN team aims to utilize a relationship-based approach to shift from *engagement* toward *partnership*.

The excitement about opportunities these partnerships bring, and we the impact the CSHN Family Partner program has already had on informing projects.

Resources for Families

Preparedness for Winter or Other Weather Events

Flooding is over for now but need for assistance continues. VT's Department of Mental Health offers a webpage with updates and other information for Flooding Resources for People with Disabilities. Flood Resources for Children, Youth, Parents and Other Caregivers.

As Vermont families prepare for winter, the following information that might help our CSHN families.

We all can be affected by weather-related emergencies long after an event. Children with intellectual or developmental disabilities can be affected by traumatic stress. Here are some tips from emergency preparedness partners:

A Fact Sheet for Parents and Caregivers of Children with Intellectual or Developmental Needs

Individuals needing assistance during a disaster can complete <u>Citizens Assistance</u> <u>Registry for Emergencies form</u>. In Vermont, Emergency Management Directors can help at the town level: <u>VEM Public Contacts</u> to find your town.

Families needing translatable information can access these recommendations from VEM:

- People with disabilities (translatable into 11 languages)
- <u>Kids</u> (translatable into 11 languages)
- <u>Winter Weather</u> (translatable into 11 languages)
- <u>Power Outages</u> (translatable into 11 languages)



Policy Corner



Vermont Policy Updates

Wheelchair Component Prior Authorization - Change to Health Care Administrative Rule 4.210 Wheelchairs, Mobility Devices and Seating Systems

 Vermont Medicaid program removed the prior authorization requirement for wheelchair components and accessories that are exact replacement as part of wheelchair repairs. Previously, prior authorization was required for all repairs greater than \$500.

- Effective September 1, 2024.
- Providers are expected to continue to maintain documentation of medical necessity for repairs.

COVID Test Kits Coverage Change

Effective October 1, 2024, Vermont Medicaid is discontinuing coverage of over-the-counter COVID-19 self-diagnostic antigen tests in the pharmacy benefit at the end of the COVID coverage period. Coverage will remain in place for tests administered by Medicaid enrolled providers including in a medical provider's office or clinic, or as inpatient or outpatient hospital services.
