About VPLOs

Established in July 2023 by the Vermont Department of Health's Division of Substance Use Programs to ensure coordinated substance misuse prevention efforts statewide.

Key Functions of the Vermont Prevention Lead Organizations:

- Fiscal Agents: Serve as fiscal agents to community organizations, managing and allocating substance misuse prevention funding within their regions.
- Regional Coordination: Collaborate through a regional advisory structure and work with district partners to distribute funds based on community assessments, risk and protective factors, and community readiness.
- Funding Allocation: Utilize a \$3 million annual state appropriation for substance misuse prevention, subgranting these funds to coalitions and other prevention partners according to regional needs.

- Address gap areas to ensure baseline primary prevention while also building capacity




Challenge

The Collaborative takes on sole LEAD and Fiscal agent for PL4.




Organizational Structure




The PL4 Advisory Committee provides high-level knowledge, networking, and multi-sector input.

001 - Mountain Views Supervisory Union

Annual conference for Woodstock-area high schools students, preventing substance abuse by empowering and training students.

003 - Prevention Works! VT

This project aims to support prevention professionals working with youth in school and community-based settings throughout the Bennington, Brattleboro, Springfield and White River Junction Health Districts.

002 - Little Rivers Healthcare

Partners with organizations to promote substance use prevention by engaging and educating adults and youth at familiar locations.

004 - Windham County Prevention Partners

Prevention coalitions in Windham County working together to support a comprehensive effort to promote wellness and prevent the use/misuse of substances, primarily by youth and young adults throughout Windham County.





We currently fund and help to support 16 partners.

005 - Springfield Area Parent Child Center

Program offering expert-led community trainings to help Early Childhood Educators and Family Support workers navigate family needs, referrals, and substance use.

007 - The Collaborative

Connection and support for schools and students regarding substance misuse prevention.

006 - VerShare Corporation

A group initiative that offers guided self-help support groups and community educational events for people coping with a family member/friend abusing drugs and/or alcohol.

008 - ACT Bennington

Increasing Youth Assets and Advancing Health Equity in Bennington

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We currently fund and help to support 16 partners.

009 - Turning Point RC of Springfield

Turning Point Recovery Center enhances the spiritual, mental, physical, and social growth of our community as a means of promoting successful recovery from substance use disorder.

011 - Hartford Community Coalition

Increasing prosocial activities for Hartford youth, expanding regional prevention education and messaging, while also assessing, growing capacity, and planning for a future teen center.

010 - BRACC

BRACC partners with GMUHS and local stakeholders to assess youth needs and engage student ambassadors in creating a downtown Chester "youth third space."

012 - Valley Court Diversion

Substance misuse prevention education and treatment referrals in a restorative justice setting.

013 - Greater Falls Connections

Inspiring and empowering people through education and collaboration to promote equity, wellness and prevent the misuse of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, with an emphasis on youth substance misuse prevention.

015 - Second Growth

provides counseling in VT and NH. PL4 funding supports Student Assistance Counselors in delivering prevention education and support to Windsor, VT middle and high school students.

014 - Friends for Change

Friends For Change is a democratically run, youth-led/adult guided, trauma-informed, and play-based club in Bellows Falls, Vermont.

016 - TRORC

Working to update existing health policy resources for municipalities and develop new model ordinance language as needed. TRORC will also coordinate with other RPC staff to foster collaboration around municipal health policy work.

017 - Turning Point Center of Bennington

Soberfest is a substance-free community event for Bennington County. The purpose of this event is to draw our community together for a day of live music, wellness activities, food, and interesting vendors all while promoting the message of sobriety and recovery. Community partners and area-wide prevention, treatment, and recovery resources will also be on site.

018 - Project Action YES

YES aims to expand and embed its existing programming into the Springfield, VT, community. Through 1:1 and group interactions, Youth Empowerment Supports (YES) uses primary and secondary prevention methods to come alongside youth aged 10-21 and their loved ones, inviting them to make healthier choices around substance use.

The Collaborative: Statewide Lead in Tobacco Prevention



- ★ The current Tobacco Grant cycle (7/2024) was the first time Tobacco Control asked coalitions in a written RFP to consider being a State Lead on various initiatives.
 - TC appointed lead on secondhand smoke policy and education
 - Vape disposal
 - Local work expanded TC's geographical reach to Bennington County and the town of Chester

Tobacco Grant Highlights

✓ Second-hand smoke education

Connecting with local and state decision-makers

- Increased protections from youth and young adult access to tobacco products
- Reduced exposure to marketing and promotions
- Protection for all Vermonters from second-hand smoke and vape emissions

Compiling and assessing existing policies, materials, and resources to inform efforts

- Identify best practices for outreach and education
- Displaying smoke-free designation signage
- Promoting updates on Vermont state laws to include regulations on e-cigarettes in cars with children

Tobacco Grant Highlights

✓ Second-hand smoke policy initiatives

Identifying smoke-free outdoor spaces, research, and drafting policy language

- The Collaborative contracted Two Rivers-Ottauquechee Regional Commission (TRORC) to research and write the Smoke-Free Policy for outdoor spaces
- (A) Model ordinance regulating tobacco use on sidewalks
- (B) Model ordinance regulating use of tobacco products, tobacco substitutes, and cannabis products, and the disposal of related equipment, in Municipal Parks
- (C) Model ordinance regulating notice of smoke-free policies at events



Green Mountain Lightning with smoke-free signage.

Challenges: Lack of best practices around sign placement. Another challenge is working with corporations when a local office wants to create a smoke-free workplace with employee cessation services but corporate is non-supportive. The workaround is the local site joins Great American Smoke Out activities this continues our connection...

Signage and sustainability – an example: Softball team, Green Mountain Lightning, contacted The Collaborative about second-hand smoke from people in cars parked near the softball field at Manchester Rec. TC helped the team get six smoke-free signs installed to support improved policy language.

Evolution of the Vape Disposal Project

- This grant cycle, TC assigned state lead included Vape Disposal and was connected directly with Josh Kelly, Solid Waste Manager at the Agency of Natural Resources who is leading the roll-out of the State's new Vape Disposal system.
- Vermont is the first state in country to pass a Household Hazardous Waste Extended
 Producer Responsibility Law (Act 58/H.67)
 - Commonly called "product stewardship" or "producer responsibility" where the maker/producer/manufacturer of the product helps with the collection program for these waste products
 - Includes nicotine vapes as a "covered" product, meaning manufacturers must pay into this program that must offer statewide collection of nicotine vapes or stop selling their products into Vermont (both online and/or brick-mortar retail).

Tobacco Grant Highlights

✓ Vape disposal education and policy

- Worked with Agency of Natural Resources and VDH to understand barriers to disposal
- Connecting cessation options to school policy as new process is launched.
- Surveying partner coalitions:
 - What are schools in your region doing with confiscated vape devices?
 - How do schools dispose of other hazardous chemicals or equipment?

Vape Disposal Barriers/Challenges/Opportunities

• Schools will need to update their policies when students bring vape paraphernalia to school.
