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INTRODUCTION

The Annual Synar Report (ASR) format provides the means for states to comply with the reporting provisions of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 300x-26) and the Tobacco Regulation for the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) (45 C.F.R. 96.130 (e)).

How the Synar report helps the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention

In accordance with the tobacco regulations, states are required to provide detailed information on progress made in enforcing youth and young adult tobacco access laws (FFY 2025 Compliance Progress) and future plans to ensure compliance with the Synar requirements to reduce youth and young adult tobacco access rates (FFY 2026 Intended Use Plan). These data are required by 42 U.S.C. 300x-26 and will be used by the Secretary to evaluate state compliance with the statute. Part of the mission of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) is to assist states by supporting Synar activities and providing technical assistance helpful in determining the type of enforcement measures and control strategies that are most effective. This information is helpful to CSAP in improving technical assistance resources and expertise on enforcement efforts and tobacco control program support activities, including state Synar program support services, through an enhanced technical assistance program involving conferences and workshops, development of training materials and guidance documents, and onsite technical assistance consultation.

How the Synar report can help states

The information gathered for the Synar report can help states describe and analyze substate needs for program enhancements. These data can also be used to report to the state legislature and other state and local organizations on progress made to date in enforcing youth and young adult tobacco access laws when aggregated statistical data from state Synar reports can demonstrate to the Secretary the national progress in reducing youth and young adult tobacco access problems. This information will also provide Congress with a better understanding of state progress in implementing Synar, including state difficulties and successes in enforcing retailer compliance

with youth and young adult tobacco access laws.

Getting assistance in completing the Synar report

Where and when to submit the Synar report

The ASR must be received by SAMHSA no later than December 31, 2025 and must be submitted in the format specified by these instructions. Use of the approved format will avoid delays in the review and approval process. The chief executive officer (or an authorized designee) of the applicant organization must sign page one of the ASR certifying that the state has complied with all reporting requirements.

The state must upload one copy of the ASR using the online WebBGAS (Block Grant Application System). In addition, the following items must be uploaded to WebBGAS:

- FFY 2026 Synar Survey Results: States that use the Synar Survey Estimation System (SSES) must upload one copy of SSES Tables 1–8 (in Excel) to WebBGAS. Please note that, in the FFY 2026 ASR, SSES will generate Tables 6, 7, and 8, which are based on the optional microdata on product type, retail outlet type, and whether identification was requested. If your state does not submit these optional data, Tables 6, 7, and 8 will be blank. Tables 6, 7, and 8 are generated for the convenience of the state, and states are not required to submit completed versions of Tables 6, 7, or 8. States that do not use SSES must upload one copy of ASR Forms 1, 4, and 5, and Forms 2 and 3, if applicable, (in Excel), as well as a database with the raw inspection data to WebBGAS.
- Synar Inspection Form: States must upload one blank copy of the inspection form used to record the result of each Synar inspection.
- Synar Inspection Protocol: States must upload a copy of the protocol used to train inspection teams on conducting and reporting the results of the Synar inspections. This document should be different than the Appendix C attached to the Annual Synar Report.
- A scanned copy of the signed Funding Agreements/Certifications

Building Capacity for Compliance: Several organizations focus on assisting retailers and municipalities with understanding and complying with tobacco control regulations. Developing a retailer packet to educate retailers about age verification, the 802Quits program, and health risks associated with tobacco use. Working with towns and educating town clerks on licensing and renewal processes, ultimately aiming to bolster their ability to manage tobacco licensing effectively

Direct Outreach to Retailers: Many organizations engage in direct outreach to retailers, providing resources, education, and support for compliance. Installing butlers with 802 Quit information at two grocery stores, reflecting a proactive approach to promoting cessation resources at points of sale. Monitoring Vermont Department of Liquor and Lottery (DLL) compliance data and conducting retail check-ins to address compliance issues related to signage and butt litter receptacles.

Leveraging Community Events and Partnerships: Several organizations utilize community events, partnerships, and third spaces to disseminate information about cessation resources and promote smoke-free environments. Reach out to convenience store owners to provide cessation information for their employees and presented information about retailer density to mayors to encourage compliance. Actively promoting My Life My Quits and 802 Quits at community events and providing these resources to youth-serving partners.

During this reporting period VDH, DLL and Tax Department worked together to combine data into DLL's reporting platform to provide accessible and comprehensive tobacco enforcement data at the local retailer level combined with sales and store audit data. This will aid understanding and work to reduce the impact of tobacco promotion and discounting at point of sale in Vermont.

Community mobilization to increase support for retailer compliance with youth and young adult access laws

Community coalition grantees continue to work in areas with poor compliance rates and engage with retailers to provide additional education about youth compliance laws, their importance to community health and the impact of tobacco promotion and displays on use among youth. The tobacco control program has had a decrease in funded community coalitions so less of the state has coverage and active work with retailers.

Message packages for VDH's vaping prevention campaign, Unhyped are implemented targeting youth and young adults. VDH staff are members of the Policy and Communication Evaluation study with Rutgers to assess awareness, knowledge and behavior change of substances including tobacco products. The study's objective and data are available at https://www.pacevt.org/. The Tobacco Program, grantees, youth groups and Offices of Local Health also conducted community education.

	For FFY 2026, Vermont will maintain its strong Synar performance by implementing the updated, SAMHSA-approved protocol that transitions from inspecting <i>all</i> licensees to using a statistically valid sample size drawn from the statewide tobacco license database. This approach meets federal requirements, increases efficiency, and preserves Vermont's ability to complete inspections on time while keeping the retailer violation rate well below the federal threshold.
	Law enforcement efforts will continue to be led by the Department of Liquor and Lottery's Office of Compliance & Enforcement. Trained officers will conduct Synar checks using approved underage decoys and will also continue routine tobacco compliance inspections outside the Synar sample. Retailers that sell during either Synar or non-Synar checks will be subject to follow-up enforcement under DLL's established graduated penalty structure.
	To support these efforts, the State will maintain its year-round retailer education program, including mandatory training, ID-check guidance, and direct technical assistance to licensees. Enforcement staff will continue coordinating with the Department of Health to align compliance-check outcomes with youth-prevention initiatives.
