Rethink Disinfecting Wipes in Classrooms Safer Alternatives for Your Classroom Supplies List July 2025

Even though they're convenient, **disinfecting wipes are notsafe for classroom use**. These wipes contain disinfectants, which are registered pesticides that can harm health. Use safer cleaning products in your classroom instead of disinfecting wipes.

Disinfectant wipes contain chemicals that are harmful



- Disinfecting wipes (for example, Lysol and Clorox brands) contain harsh chemicals that have been linked to health issues.
- Touching and breathing in disinfectants can cause eye, skin and respiratory irritation.
- The fragrances and ingredients in disinfecting wipes can trigger allergic reactions, may disrupt hormones and harm reproduction, and can **cause or worsen asthma**.
 - Roughly 9,000 children in Vermont have asthma, and 1 in 3 missed at least one day of school due to their asthma.
 - Reducing exposure to harmful chemicals that trigger asthma can reduce the rate of absenteeism and keep kids in your classroom

Most of the time, you only need to clean



- Cleaning removes germs, dirt and debris from surfaces.
- You don't need fancy cleaners. Regular **soap and water** or a fragrancefree all-purpose cleaner can effectively remove most germs.
- You can keep your classroom clean and safe by:
 - Asking custodial staff for a spray bottle of soap and water or an approved all-purpose cleaner for your classroom. Approved cleaners, like those certified by <u>Safer Choice</u> or <u>Green Seal</u>, are safer for health and the environment.
 - Requesting fragrance-free baby wipes, paper towels or microfiber cloths on your classroom supplies list.

Ask custodial staff to disinfect when needed



- Disinfectants (including disinfecting wipes) are registered pesticides.
 They should only be used according to their labels and should not be used around children.
- Only certain areas require the use of disinfectants. Objects and surfaces should be disinfected when there is vomit or feces, or when it is required by law.
- School custodial staff are trained in the proper use and handling of disinfectants.
