

Long-Term Care Guidance After COVID-19 Public Health Emergency

May 2023

On May 11, 2023, the federal COVID-19 Public Health Emergency declaration ended. This memo summarizes how this change affects long-term care facilities in Vermont. While many COVID-19 recommendations will stay the same for Vermont facilities, this is an opportunity to further integrate COVID-19 procedures into ongoing public health practices.

(New) COVID-19 Community and Transmission Levels are now replaced by Hospital Admission Level.

- Facilities are encouraged to use the statewide Hospital Level and the Vermont Department of Health's Weekly COVID-19 Surveillance Report when considering using universal masking or testing strategies.
- The Health Department will be monitoring hospitalizations and other indicators and may periodically make additional recommendations to facilities in Vermont, especially when other respiratory viruses are circulating.

(New) The "Long-Term Care Guidance for Operations During COVID-19 Health Emergency" document will not be updated and should no longer be used.

• Facilities should incorporate COVID-19 guidance into their own infection prevention and control plans. <u>Health's COVID-19 Epidemiology Program</u> and the <u>Department of Aging and</u> <u>Independent Living's (DAIL) Strike Team</u> can assist with developing facility plans.

Reporting requirements for Vermont facilities, providers and labs have not changed.

Nursing and health care facilities are still required to report COVID-19 cases to **both** of the following:

- Report all COVID-19 cases in your facility to the Health Department. This includes residents and staff who may have been in the facility while infected with COVID-19. This fulfills the statutory requirement to report any COVID-19 outbreaks. For more information, see 5.1 and 5.4 of the <u>Reportable and Communicable Disease Rule</u>.
- Report any COVID-19 test results administered at a long-term care facility to the CDC's National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN). This fulfills the requirement to report any COVID-19 laboratory results. For more information, see section 6 of the <u>Reportable and</u> <u>Communicable Disease Rule</u>.

Testing recommendations have not changed.

COVID-19 should not prevent admission or discharge, but receiving or discharging facilities should notify the other facility of a positive COVID-19 case.

- Test residents on admission if they have symptoms or are suspected to recently have had high-risk contact with someone with COVID-19.
- Facilities can test asymptomatic residents at their own discretion or based on Vermont's Hospitalization Level or other public health guidance.
- If there is a positive COVID-19 case in the facility, test any staff and residents who had close contact with the person with COVID-19. If close contacts cannot be identified, test all staff and residents in the group or unit of the person with COVID-19.

Masking recommendations for infections, symptoms and exposures have not changed.

For Individuals:

- Face masks are recommended for individuals with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 or compatible symptoms, and for close contacts for 10 days after being exposed to an infected person.
- Face masks may be worn as a personal preference and should be worn by health care providers or personnel at the request of a patient or resident.

Facilities or Units:

- Masking is recommended for all staff and residents in the unit or area of the facility experiencing a COVID-19 or other outbreak until 14 days have passed with no new cases.
- Facilities should consider facility- or unit-wide masking in higher-risk areas, areas serving higher-risk residents and patients, and during periods of higher COVID-19 Hospitalization Levels or other respiratory virus transmission.
- Facilities should solicit input from stakeholders and consider a coordinated approach with other facilities and health care agencies in their area to determine practices that will be more broadly supported.

During Visitation:

- Facilities are recommended to defer non-urgent visitation when visitors have confirmed or suspected COVID-19, had a known exposure, or are symptomatic.
- Consider requesting visitors to wear a mask based on increasing hospitalization levels or other public health guidance.
- Visitors should be encouraged to wear a mask while visiting a resident who has tested positive for COVID-19 or a unit or facility experiencing transmission.

For Residents Leaving the Facility:

- Facilities should consider recommending masks for residents leaving the facility when the Hospitalization Level is high or at other times recommended by the Health Department.
- For residents at higher risk, or those who spend time in higher-risk units, facilities may consider recommending masks when Vermont's Hospitalization Level is medium or when other respiratory viruses are known to be circulating.
