# Improving Vaccination Rates Among Residents in Long-term Care Facilities

Residents in long-term care facilities are at high risk for severe illness from respiratory viruses. It is critical that residents be vaccinated against flu, COVID-19, and RSV during respiratory illness season. High vaccination rates among residents help prevent facility outbreaks, reduce absences, and limit hospitalizations and deaths.

<u>Vaccination rates in facilities are too low</u>. In Vermont, **Gill Odd Fellows Home** (Ludlow) and the **Pines at Rutland Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation** had **the highest resident vaccination rates** of over 85% in 2023-2024. Read some of the tips they shared below.

#### **Proactive Communication**



 Use multiple communication channels like one-on-one discussions, calls to families, <u>posters in common areas</u>, word-of-mouth, and social media. <u>Download our communication toolkit</u>.

#### **Education**



- Address vaccine-related questions and <u>misconceptions</u>.
- Proactively spend time on follow-ups and education, reinforcing the importance of vaccination.
- Make sure residents and families understand the benefits of vaccines with patient-focused discussions.

### **Convenience and Accessibility**



- Provide on-site vaccination clinics to eliminate the need for outside appointments and to address geographic and transpotation barriers.
- Offer additional vaccines like RSV, PNA, tetanus, and shingles.

## **Consent at Admission**



 Obtain vaccination consent at admission or shortly afterwards to streamline decision-making and identify people in need of additional education.



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
