# Improving Vaccination Rates Among Staff in Long-term Care Facilities

It is critical that staff working in long-term care facilities be vaccinated against flu, COVID-19, and RSV (if eligible) during respiratory illness season. High staff vaccination rates help prevent facility outbreaks, reduce absences, and limit hospitalizations and deaths.

<u>Vaccination rates in facilities are too low</u>. In Vermont, <u>Birchwood Terrace Rehab & Healthcare</u> (Burlington) and <u>Gill Odd Fellows Home</u> (Ludlow) had the <u>highest staff</u> <u>vaccination rates</u> of about 50% in 2023-2024. Read some of the tips they shared below.

#### **Proactive Communication**



- Use multiple communication channels like one-on-one discussion, posters in staff areas, and word-of-mouth. <u>Download our communication toolkit</u>.
- Facilities that repeated attempts to overcome vaccine hesitancy have been the most successful in increasing staff vaccination rates.

#### **Education**



- Address vaccine-related questions and <u>misconceptions</u>. Actively discuss vaccine concerns with staff to promote informed decision-making.
- Normalize vaccinations as a routine and expected part of working with vulnerable populations.

## **Convenience and Accessibility**



- On-site vaccination clinics eliminate the need for outside appointments and transportation barriers.
- Provide vaccines at no cost to reduce financial barriers.

### **Masking Requirements**



• Establish policies that require unvaccinated staff to wear masks during respiratory illness season (October through May).



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
