<b>Welcome, Introductions, and Quorum Determination</b>	Dr Levine and Amy Brewer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The focus and support of substance use prevention that this Council continues to be important in ensuring resources are allocated and secured for prevention services. For example, during the 2024 legislative session, the \$3 million allocated for prevention programming was not fully secured for the SFY25 budget until Senator Kitchell addressed it.</li> <li>Senator Westman was also incredibly helpful in taking the time to understand how prevention funding was being utilized and help translate that for his colleagues as well.</li> <li>Additional feedback heard from an SMPC member this session was the importance of Diversity and Equity to be embedded in all aspects of the SMPC work and highlight the work happening in community-based prevention work as well related to Diversity and Equity.</li> <li>Thank you to Charlie Gurney during his last SMPC meeting before he retires for his wonderful work in supporting older Vermonters!</li> </ul>

<b>Department of Liquor and Lottery Compliance</b>	Skyler Genest	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Reviewed 2023 Tobacco Compliance Report: <a href="#">2023DLLTobaccoComplianceReportFinal.pdf (vermont.gov)</a></li> <li>Alcohol compliance is done utilizing the same process, and both retail (grocery store, liquor outlets, etc.) and on-site consumption (bars and restaurants) are reviewed through this process.</li> <li>There is statutory compulsion to complete tobacco related compliance, there is no statutory</li> </ul>

<b>Funding Report Out</b>	Rhonda Williams, Tanya Wells	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Tobacco Control Program (TCP) received applications totally twice the amount of funding that they were able to award.</li> <li>• The funding is approximately \$740,000 each year, and 9 grantees were funded; this included different entities than were funded previously and expands the work to funding coalition and non-coalition work.</li> <li>• Part of the intention of this work was to coordinate with the Prevention Lead Organization Work happening to further compliment prevention infrastructure.</li> <li>•</li> </ul>
<b>Review and Discuss SMPC Goals and Performance Measures</b>	Nicole Rau Mitiguy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The following goals and performance measures were identified by the SMPC in 2019 and have not been readdressed:</li> </ul> <p><b>Measurable Goals for Prevention Programming</b></p> <p>The Substance Misuse Prevention Oversight and Advisory Council identified the following three goals as necessary for effective substance misuse prevention statewide:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Increase protective factors and build resilience and feelings of connectedness in Vermont communities, across all ages, cultures, and socioeconomic conditions.</li> <li>2. Decrease risk factors for substance misuse in Vermont for individuals of all ages, cultures, and socioeconomic conditions.</li> <li>3. Increase efficiency and collaboration on prevention efforts across all state, public, and private entities, through a consolidated and holistic approach to prevention that is sustainable, scalable, and equitable.</li> </ol> <p>The SMPC utilizes the Performance Measures below to help measure these three goals.</p> <p><b>Performance Measures Demonstrating System Results</b></p> <p>The SMPC tracks the population outcome measures below using data from the Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), and the Young Adult Survey (YAS) to inform the effectiveness of prevention programming statewide. The SMPC also utilizes</p>

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		<p>additional measures from these surveys to inform their review and recommendations about Vermont's prevention system.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Percent of high school and middle school students who believe they matter to their community. (Measures Goal #1 and is measured through the Youth Risk Behavior Survey).</li> <li>2. Percent of high school and middle school students who perceive harm in using substances (marijuana, alcohol, and tobacco). (Measures Goal # 1 and is measured through the Youth Risk Behavior Survey).</li> <li>3. Percent of Vermonters aged 12 years old and older who used alcohol, marijuana, and/or tobacco in the last 30 days. (Measures Goal #2 and is measured through the National Survey on Drug Use and Health).</li> <li>4. Percent of Vermonters aged 18-24 who use alcohol, cannabis, tobacco, stimulants (prescription and illicit) and opioids (prescription and illicit). (Measures Goal #2 and is measured primarily through the Vermont Young Adult Survey).</li> <li>5. Number of prevention initiatives and services available and sustainably funded across Vermont's communities and schools. (Measures Goal #3 and is measured through review of state and federal investments in prevention).</li> </ol> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Feedback collected during the meeting:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Goals are good in general but feel a bit dated without Health Equity being mentioned specifically</li> <li>○ The SMPC should acknowledge the specific focus on subgroups of our population such as people of color with mentholated cigarette products, vaping products with cartoons on them, flavored products – it might be time to call out those pieces and be more specific in our goals and performance measures to better reflect those most impacted by substances</li> <li>○ We have little to no measuring of our Goal 3</li> <li>○ Should we address more of the quality of prevention programming and not just the number of programs?</li> <li>○ Our performance measures do not speak effectively to all ages; we need to be more specific in those related to age.</li> <li>○ These performance measures reflect the broader prevention system as a whole but do not necessarily reflect the work of the SMPC specifically – should we adjust them? Do we need to review and address our logic model as part of that?</li> <li>○ It may be important to call out the data we would like to see collected, if it isn't currently</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
