SURVEY DESCRIPTION

Mailed to PAs with the license renewal forms in December 2007

Followed up via mail and phone calls

The final response rate was over 99%

SUMMARY

- There were 191 PAs working in Vermont.
- 58% (110) of the PAs were female.
- Ages ranged from 25 to 63, with a median of 44.

SUMMARY

- 58% of PAs have worked in Vermont 9 years or less
- 18% have worked in Vermont 20 years or more
- 25% of the PAs are 55 or older
- A quarter of those over 55 are planning to retire or leave Vermont within 5 years

PRIMARY CARE

45% (85) worked mainly in primary care:

- 30% (58) in family practice
- 8% (15) in internal medicine
- 5% (9) in obstetrics and gynecology
- 2% (3) in pediatric primary care

PRIMARY CARE

- 85% of primary care PAs accept new patients
- 66% accept new Medicaid patients
- 77% accept new Medicare patients.

SPECIALTY CARE

55% (106) worked mainly in specialty care:

- 18% (35) in emergency medicine
- 18% (34) in various surgery specialties
- 4% (8) in dermatology
- 5% (9) in internal medicine
- 2% (4) in urology
- 8% (16) all other specialties

CHANGES OVER TIME

- As compared with 2006:
 - There was an increase of 28 PAs, 2 in primary care and 26 in specialty care.
 - More PAs worked 40 hours or more per week.
 - There were more PAs in all age groups, but the biggest increase was in those of age 55 and older.


CHANGES OVER TIME

- As compared with 2006:
 - There was a 2.2 FTEs net increase in primary care, statewide.
 - Orleans, Orange and Franklin Counties had the largest increases.
 - Essex, Chittenden and Addison Counties had the largest decreases.

CHANGES OVER TIME

- As compared with 2006:
 - There was a net increase of 23.7 FTEs in specialty care, statewide.
 - Chittenden County had the largest increase,
 9.3 additional FTEs.
 - Windsor and Orange counties also had large increases.


AGE DISTRIBUTION



15% of all PAs are under the age of 35



AGE DISTRIBUTION BY GENDER




58% of all PAs are female; 76% of PAs under age 35 are female

SPECIALTY BY GENDER




Most primary care PAs are female, most emergency medicine PAs are male

NUMBER OF PAS BY COUNTY




Although 27% of PAs work in more than one location, in this chart each PA is counted only once, in their main specialty and main county of practice.

NUMBER OF PA FTEs BY COUNTY




All sites and specialties of each PA are counted. One FTE is defined as 40 or more hours per week.

YEARS WORKED IN VERMONT




42% of PAs have worked in Vermont 10 or more years


NUMBER OF SITES OF PRACTICE
