Health Department Continues to Urge Vaccination at H1N1 Clinics

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BURLINGTON – The Vermont Department of Health is urging all Vermonters over 6 months of age to get vaccinated against the H1N1 flu.

“It’s not too late to protect yourself and your loved ones,” said Health Commissioner Wendy Davis, MD. “If you haven’t already done so, now is a great time to get vaccinated at a public clinic, by your health care provider, at school or other settings. Vaccine is now widely available, and there are still months of flu season ahead of us.”

The Health Department opened vaccination to everyone in Vermont on Dec. 21, and the shots and nasal spray vaccine are provided at no charge at clinics statewide.
