# **Community Health Workers in Vermont**

**Integration Snapshot: Involvement in Clinical Teams** 

**March 2022** 

#### Introduction

This brief provides a summary of key data points about the integration of community health workers (CHWs) derived from a May 2021 survey<sup>i</sup> of 128 CHWs and 33 CHW employers from across Vermont. The survey, conducted by the Vermont Department of Health (VDH), in collaboration with the Vermont CHW Steering Committee, represents an ongoing effort by VDH to collect information about the roles, scope of work, skills, and training of the current CHW workforce in the state.

To assess integration of CHWs into clinical care teams, the survey contained a number of questions for the 26 CHWs and 10 CHW employers who reported working in a hospital/health system, federally qualified health center, or other community health center.

### **Clinical Care Team Relationships and Responsibilities**

92% of CHWs reported working directly with members of a clinical care team, with the top 5 most common team members being: primary care providers (83%), registered nurses (83%), behavioral health care providers (70%), social workers (65%), and other CHWs (57%).



#### **Access to and Use of Electronic Health Records**

CHWs who have access to EHRs can do the following activities with the records:

**96%** of CHWs who work in a health system with electronic health records have access to patients' records

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>i</sup> A note about survey methods and respondents: Data for this brief was gathered from a web-based survey (administered 05/03/2021-05/28/2021) of a convenience sample of CHWs and CHW employers across Vermont. A total of 145 CHWs and 33 CHW employers responded to the survey. Upon analysis, VDH and PDA excluded 17 participants as they did not appear to be CHWs. This was the second year VDH gathered information via surveys about CHW professionals and organizations that engage CHWs. It is not clear the extent to which the responses are representative of all CHWs or all organizations that engage CHWs in Vermont.
