- <u>School-based/Community-based prevention (Lori Uerz, ADAP; Jolinda LaClair)</u>
 - Federal funds support a large portion of Vermont prevention work. Some are demonstration funds. These dollars don't continue.
 - School-based funding to 20 supervisory unions. There are some required activities, some voluntary
 - Secretary Holcombe had said, If we don't unify community and school based programs at the community door, we will not be as successful as we could be.
 - Tobacco Prevention Coordinator position in Agency of Education has been retooled to included other substance use. New staff person is Beth Keister.
 - Recognition to Bob Uerz for his work in the earlier position, and collaboration with the OCC.
 - Lori described the "socio-Ecological Model" of community based prevention work comprehensive, and addressing individuals, schools, businesses, etc.
 - RPP grant 12 lead agencies, 34-36 sub-grantees. Statewide prevention.
 - o 23 prevention coalitions
 - Community-based requires "boots on the ground" regional structure, but local engagement. Evaluation is woven throughout.
 - Last year, \$2 million of STR community grant 10 communities. Opioid summit and more.
 - Year 2 of CURES grant, includes drug disposal pilot year 2.
- Update from Sheriff Roger Marcoux
 - o Drug Disposal
 - Event coming up this weekend (April 29)
 - They (Lamoille) collect from kiosks around the state monthly. Collected 3,500 lbs of drugs in five months. DEA estimates that 10% of the drugs received are opioids. This is a very rough estimate.
 - o Youth Leadership Programs
 - 16 Lamoille youth went to Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) training in February – from HS seniors to middle school students, mix of students from low to higher risk levels. This is "demand reduction"
- Youth Engagement: Bess O'Brien
 - Working on a new project that aligns with past efforts, which include

- An original musical based on the lives of teens the Voices Project voices of those affected – staged and recorded – engaged youth deeply – 1,000 involved
- o Best practice: Ask the kids what do you want/need
 - ACEs
 - Resilience
 - They want to act
- Ready to collaborate
- Umatter: MaryEllen Tarallo: Statewide youth campaign with focuses on if you need help, or if you are in a position to help.
- ADAP/Lori Uerz:
 - Media campaigns
 - sharps disposal, syringe services, Parent UP
- Diane Derby: Senator Leahy's office:
 - \$130 Million to rural communities will help eligible Vermont areas including Northeast Kingdom, Windham); additional grant information available
- Grace Keller: Safe Recovery Syringe Services (Howard Center) Chittenden
 - Safe Recovery is major distributor of Narcan (estimate 70%)
 - Question: how many schools have Narcan on site?
- Dawn Poitras: Student Assistance Professional, Barre
 - o Lost Community Coalition, and are now working with the Montpelier coalition
 - Need research-based curricula needs are different in different places
 - Recovery services for kids grades 5 12 (tobacco and beyond)
- Mitch Barron: Centerpoint
 - Need (and try to take) broader perspective/scope
 - Early intervention and identification
 - Secondary screening and intervention
 - o Access and engagement
 - Centerpoint in many different schools, 11 different funding sources. No such thing as "the funding"
 - Many schools use an integrated service model that integrates funding as well
 - Sometimes, grants make a "Frankenstein" patching parts together need focus on <u>need</u>
 - "Checkpoint" is SBIRT (Screening/referral) for youth
 - Replicable, scalable, adaptable models
- Chuck Whitehead: Project Vision, Rutland
 - o Began 2012
 - o RutStat is the information-sharing between law enforcement and service providers
 - Street level social worker
 - Sent team to Boston in December re the Police-Assisted Recovery Initiative (PARI) model
 - Soft hand-off to a peer coach
 - Partnering: Rutland Mental Health, Peer Coach from Turning Point Center, and SBIRT at Medical center – plus the Project Vision team – not implemented yet, but preparing.
 - Considering a safe station
