1. Opening Remarks	D. Englander provided an overview of the purpose of the public meeting.
2. Section 4.4.2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • K. Gandhi commented that the Commissioner should only grant a waiver on determination that it would not pose a significant threat to public health. • K. Gandhi also commented that if a waiver was granted 25% of the outlets should have to be tested on a rotating basis, not five taps.
3. Section 6.6.1	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • K. Gandhi indicated that the signage posting requirement is not a permitted deterrent per EPA's 3Ts Manual, even as temporary remediation.
4. Section 7.1.1	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • K. Gandhi commented that the language used under the 4th bullet would need to be stronger, to include information about the potential health effects of exposure to lead in drinking water even testing a result at 1ppb.
5. Section 8.1	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • K. Gandhi indicated that childcare facilities not located within or operated by a school should complete testing annually rather than every three (3) years.
6. General Questions/Comments	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • K. Gandhi commented that stakeholders were supportive of the language in the rule: (1) that references teeth brushing being included in the rule, (2) of 1 ppb being used as the standard for exempting for future testing, (3) the inclusion of striving to achieve the lowest possible testing, and (4) the defined deadlines for submitting and completing remediation plans. • K. Gandhi also indicated that VPIRG would also submit comments in writing.
