

Sentinel Flu Provider Information

Sentinel flu providers help improve flu surveillance.



Sentinel flu providers help the Health Department monitor flu activity and understand how flu is affecting Vermonters by submitting data each week to the national flu surveillance network.

What is ILINet?

The U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness (ILI) Surveillance Network. Providers across the country volunteer to send year-round ILI data to CDC. This is used in combination with other influenza surveillance data by Vermont and CDC to get a picture of influenza activity within the state and across the country.

Who can be a sentinel provider?

Physicians, physician assistants and nurse practitioners of any specialty and in any type of practice are eligible. Practice settings that are not eligible are elementary, middle or high school health centers and any type of institutional setting.

What is required of sentinel providers?

Each week, sentinel providers enter the total number of patient visits and the number of patient visits for ILI by age group (0-4, 5-24, 25-49, 50-64, and 65+) on the ILINet Internet Reporting System.

What is the case definition for ILI?

Fever (recorded temperature of >100°F) and cough and/or sore throat in the absence of a known cause.

How does a provider become a sentinel provider?
